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Executive Summary

This plan is the Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan for Meigs County. This plan was initially developed in 2008 and currently being updated in 2020. This plan fulfills the requirements of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) under the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, signed into law as a reauthorization of surface transportation programs through Fiscal Year 2020. According to requirements of the FAST Act, locally developed coordinated public transit-human services transportation plans must be updated to reflect the changes established by the FAST Act legislation. The FAST Act applies new programs and rules for all Fiscal Year 2016 funds and authorizes transit programs for five (5) years.

Transportation is a critical component of the communities in Meigs County. Transportation provides access to jobs, education, health care, human services and allows all community members, including older adults and people with disabilities, to live independently and engage in community life. It is the purpose of this plan for local stakeholders to work collaboratively to do the following activities:

1. Identify all community resources including:
 - Public door-to-door accessible van providers
 - Senior transportation providers
 - Veteran transportation providers
 - Transportation network company services
 - Inter-city transportation providers NET only
 - Facebook Rideshares
 - NET Transportation

2. Identify and Prioritize community transportation needs:
 - Implementation of the Meigs County Active Transportation plan (1)
 - Implementation of a transit system in Meigs County (2)
 - Implementation of a paratransit in Meigs County (3)
 - Education and outreach of services (4)
 - Coordination of services (5)

3. Establish a clear plan for achieving shared goals
 - Meigs County will start coordination efforts with all transportation providers to achieve the goals and meet the needs as listed in the Coordinated Transit Plan. Through partnerships with the community and various stakeholders across the county we will work together towards achieving the goals as stated in this plan. The Meigs County Mobility Management program will utilize the plan as guidance for future transportation initiatives throughout the county and region.

Fundamental to the Coordinated Transportation Plan process is the active and meaningful involvement of stakeholders. For projects selected for funding under the Section 5311 program, participation in planning activities must include participation and/or representation of the following, at minimum:

- Seniors;
- Individuals with disabilities;
- People with low incomes;
- Public, private and non-profit transportation providers;
- Human services providers,
- The general public,
- Social Service providers
- Workforce

A total of five (5) transportation round tables were held via teams meeting. Due to COVID-19 in person meetings could not take place. Patrons who wanted to attend but did not have computer access were given different community outlets so that they could participate and even call in by phone.

The roundtables' dates, locations and times were distributed on flyers, advertised in the Pomeroy Daily Sentinel a total of six times. Announcements were also placed on numerous social media outlets and partnering websites. All round table discussions were held at different dates, times and multiple accommodations in order to ensure multiple measures were in place in advance to offer a higher participation rate.

This plan was developed and adopted by a planning committee Meigs County Coordinated Plan Planning Committee. More information about the planning committee can be found in Appendix A.

I. Geographic Area


*According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 433 square miles (1,120 km²), of which 430 square miles (1,100 km²) is land and 2.9 square miles (7.5 km²) (0.7%) is water. The Ohio River forms the eastern and southern boundaries of the county, the other side of which is located in West Virginia.

Meigs County lies in the Appalachian Plateau physiographic region of the Appalachian Mountains. The landscape is anywhere from gently rolling to rugged, typical of a dissected plateau. Elevations range from 1,020 feet (310 m) ASL (above sea level) in the southwest to about 535 feet (163 m) ASL in the far south-central part of the county along the Ohio River. The majority of Meigs County is drained by two sub watersheds of the Ohio River, Shade River and Leading Creek. Another stream of note is Raccoon Creek, which flows through a small area of the northwestern corner of the county.

Map 1: Basic map of the geographic area covered by the plan



II. Population Demographics

According to DATAUSA.IO employees in Meigs County, OH have a longer commute time (29.7 minutes) than the normal US worker (25.1 minutes). Additionally, 4.78% of the workforce in Meigs County, OH have “super commutes” in excess of 90 minutes. 81% of Meigs County Residents drive alone, 12.8% carpools, and 4.09% works from home.

The census report shows that 22.4% of persons in Meigs County fall below the average poverty line. Children under the age of 18 and senior citizens 65 + make up the vast majority of this percentile.

Meigs County employs 2,591; with 319 employer establishments. The unemployment rate in Meigs County, OH was 11.6% in June of 2020, according to the United States federal reserve. Historically, unemployment rates in Meigs County, OH reached a record high of 17.4% in January 2010 and a record low of 5.3% in May of 2001.




Chart 2: Total Population by Age Group






Disabled Population, Percent by PUMA, 2009-11





III. Assessment of Available Services

Conducting an evaluation of service provider capabilities and analyzing the existing gaps and duplications of services for transportation resources in each community, provides transportation planners with the information needed to implement changes that will improve the network of transportation resources and services in Meigs county and across county lines.

Your agency is considered closed door if you ONLY provide transportation to your facility as a courtesy or if you ONLY serve a particular clientele that are enrolled in your agency programs (i.e. members of a sheltered workshop, or residents in a nursing home). Answering “No” indicates that your agency is open door. This means the service is open to the public or a segment of the general public defined by age, disability, or low income. For example, if an agency provides general transportation for anyone in the community who is over the age of 60, they are considered “open door”. For example, an individual who is 60 or over can request transportation to a doctor’s appointment or the grocery store regardless of their affiliation with your agency.

The participating organizations provide a wide range of transportation including; fixed route-students only, taxi service, referral and voucher services, on-demand clients only volunteer services, H/PC, NMT, medical & ADA paratransit. Twenty-eight of the participating organizations provide services on weekdays. One operates transportation on Saturdays and none on Sundays. Assessment of Community Support for Transit

Meigs County has always had a lack and a serious need for transportation. The transportation issue is great for this county and has been for years, limiting the community to certain resources that would be better obtained if transportation were an option. Meigs County does recognize the need for transportation services in the region and has a long history of overall support for transportation initiatives. Meigs County Job and Family Services and the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) have worked hard to facilitate the Meigs County Mobility Management (MCMM) project starting in January 2020. MCMM is a position dedicated to the following:

- Increasing understanding and awareness of community transportation needs
- Increasing awareness of current community transportation options and programs
- Ensuring that transportation considerations are included in local and regional planning activities
- Increasing local capacity for transportation services
- Assisting individuals with accessing all community transportation options
- Planning for sustainability
- Encouraging innovation and flexibility to reach the “right fit” solution for customers
- Striving for easy information and referrals to assist customers in learning about and using services
- Continually incorporating customer feedback as services are evaluated and adjusted

The MCMM program will serve as the coordinating force for organizations and individuals in the Meigs County community. MCMM is currently funded by the 5311 Grant. The MCMM will work collaboratively with all stakeholders and the community to form an Active Meigs Transportation Collaboration Team. This team will meet monthly to go over different changes or updates in the community. The purpose of this meeting will be for continued growth in Meigs county and community buy-in.

Safety

All transportation providers in Meigs County are dedicated to ensuring safe transportation for all riders, drivers, and pedestrians. Although different providers require different safety courses for their drivers there are requirements for each provider to ensure safe practices.

Amendment Consideration

The Meigs County Mobility Manager will work with the current EMA Director to make an amendment to the Base Plan 2018 to include the following information below per ODOT's guidelines for the Meigs County Coordinated Plan. The EMA Base Plan 2018 includes a few resources regarding transportation; ambulance, fire trucks, school buses and the Emergency Response Vehicle are currently outlined in the EMA Base Plan 2018. Meigs County does not have a transit system and is extremely limited of its transportation resources, so the EMA Base Plan 2018 does not cover much regarding Transportation Services or systems. A copy of the EMA Base Plan 2018, can be sent upon request.

The Meigs County Mobility Manager and the EMA Director will focus on the following amendments:

1. Provide a summary of what that means for transportation – pay close attention to the transportation section of the mass care in the County Emergency Operations Plan.
2. What is the protocol when it comes to specialized populations?
 - (a) Seniors
 - (b) Homebound with service animals
 - (c) Persons with disabilities
 - (d) Persons with critical medical needs
 - (e) Homeless persons
 - (f) CRCF's include nursing homes, assisted living centers, drug treatment centers, group homes, residential homes, foster homes, adult and childcare facilities, etc.
 - (g) Hospitals
 - (h) Correctional Facilities

The first step in the planning process identified each hazard that is a possible threat to the county and its political subdivisions and provided the basis for the basic plan and the functional annexes. Communication Process

1. The following Agencies & Governmental Agency Heads; addressed in the EMA Plan are in charge of but not limited to vetting all efforts up through the EMA Director. All Agencies in the EMA plan are responsible to ensure a clean and clear line of communication. The agencies listed in the EMA plan are:

 - a. The Meigs County Dispatch Center is the county's central location for receipt and initial dissemination of emergency notifications and warnings. It operates 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. The dispatch center receives notifications for all emergencies affecting the county. These notifications may come from any source but come primarily via the 9-1-1 system. When another agency receives an emergency notification, it immediately notifies the Dispatch Center- even if that agency can deal with the incident itself. The Ohio State Highway Patrol (OSHP) is the State of Ohio Warning Point for the National Warning System (NAWAS). Upon receipt of NAWAS warning affecting Meigs County, the OSHP, District 9 Headquarters, Jackson, Ohio notifies the Sherriff's Office Dispatch Center. In addition to this notification, all NAWAS warnings are sent over the Law Enforcement Automated Data System (LEADS) to law enforcement agencies in the warning area.

Communication to the General Public

The jurisdictional law enforcement agency initiates notifications to the general public using the following:

- *Code Red* is the primary notification system with the siren system second
 - *Door-to-door* notification or mobile public-address systems by emergency response and/or emergency management personnel
 - Local broadcast and print media and announcements over scanners.
 - Special cases such as nursing homes, occupied schools, and highly populated facilities receive the warning and notification by direct contact via two-way communications (telephone or radio) or person-to-person contact
 - Notification and warning to hearing impaired or non-English speaking persons are notified by the above methods or by initiating the EAS broadcast systems required text in special language messages and via crawlers during television EAS broadcasts and closed caption devices when available
 - In the most populated areas siren controllers activated from central dispatch system can be programmed for specific situations for public notification.
 - If electrical system fail during the emergency, protective action information will be announced door-to-door and/or by the bullhorns or public-address systems, by law enforcement officers and fire responders.
 - Following a disaster, handing out recovery information published in native languages and alternative formats such as Braille and large print. Identify how the coordinating committee will assist in the process.

structures, demolishing county owned hazardous structures, establishing emergency traffic detours and road blocks. Providing equipment and operators as needed.

- ii. Reporting closed county roads to the Sherriff's office
 - iii. Determining the safety of the evacuation routes
 - iv. Storing and providing fuel for county emergency vehicles
7. Director of Job and Family Services
- i. Identifying needs of people as a result of emergencies/disasters and coordinating response with responding agencies
 - ii. Assisting people apply for grants administered by the department
8. Coroner
- i. Coordinating resources to collect, identify, and dispose of deceased persons and human tissue
 - ii. Determining when the dead are removed from the scene of mass casualties. Selecting sites to establish temporary morgues. Identifying mass-burial sites. Protecting the property and personal effects of the deceased.
 - iii. Coordinating services of funeral directors, ambulances, EMS, and other pathologists; dentists and x-ray technicians for purposes of identification and jurisdictional law enforcement agencies for security, property protection and evidence collection
9. Health Commissioner
- i. Coordinating with the water, public works or sanitation, as appropriate, to ensure the availability of portable water and an effective sewage system and sanitary garbage disposal.

Vehicles

Survey/Interview participants listed a combined total of 150 vehicles. Approximately 17% of the vehicles are wheelchair accessible. A vehicle utilization table is provided at the end of this chapter (Table 6). Several transportation providers did not provide information for the vehicle utilization form but did provide information regarding the number of vehicles and wheelchair accessible vehicles in their fleets. Those numbers are reflected in the total amount of vehicles listed above and in the remainder of this document.

Not all the transportation providers provide a wheelchair accessible vehicle. Most organizations had at least one, while some organizations have an entire fleet of wheelchair accessible vehicles. Currently, wheelchair accessible vehicles available to the public are only available during certain hours and days. The need for these vehicles remains high as several providers are running at full capacity and sometimes must deny ride requests. As vehicles age, they require additional maintenance, may break down more often, and become more costly to operate. Vehicle replacement, based on age and condition, is vital to the overall cost effectiveness of the transportation services provided.

Summary of Existing Resources

An overall summary of existing resources and an inventory of current services allows for a better insight into opportunities to coordinate services and the transportation gaps that we are currently experiencing in our county.

Meigs County has several private transportation providers whose focus is to provide either private transportation or Non-Emergency Transportation (NET). These providers only provide services to clients who qualify under certain criteria or are associated with the organization and its services. There are certain taxis that will come to Meigs county from other counties, but the costs associated with those transports are extremely high and not feasible for most individuals in Meigs County.

The summary of existing resources illustrates gaps in services in the county including:

- No availability of public and accessible services through the week or on the weekends
- Unavailability of wheelchair accessible vehicles because the options available are at capacity
- A lack of county-wide affordable services
- A lack of non-emergency medical transportation providers that are open to the public
- A lack of services that operate inside and outside of Meigs County
- A need for the coordination of efforts, specifically with wheelchair accessible vehicles
- A need for county wide collaboration for street, sidewalk and safe-crossing repair projects

IV. Assessment of Transportation Needs and Gaps

In an effort to better understand Meigs County needs, the planning committee examined research and data, as well as solicited input from the community in an effort to gather information about needs and gaps in transportation services.

The demographic and socio-economic conditions of the study area are discussed in the Demographics Chapter of this plan. The following overview is an evaluation of the gaps in service based upon geographic data as well as from the perspective of the targeted populations, transportation providers, and the general public.

The Meigs County Mobility Manager coordinated a variety of stakeholder meetings in the area to solicit input and request participation from any organization that could potentially be impacted by the coordinated transportation planning process. More information on how the lead agency engaged stakeholder and the general public is available upon request.

The following methods were used to assess transportation needs and gaps

- Assessment of data and demographics
- Release of five (5) transportation surveys to the County that focused on:
 - Meigs County Public Needs Survey (General public)
 - Meigs County assessment of available services
 - Meigs Coordinated Transportation Coalition (Business owners)
 - Seniors
 - Disabled Individuals
- Five Transportation Round Tables held over the phone (in person not an option due to global pandemic)


Local Demographic and Socio-Economic Data

Data for each target population group were aggregated by Census Block Group for transportation analysis. The demographic and socio-economic data is valuable because it provides a comparison of where the highest and lowest densities of individuals live who are most likely to need transportation. This information can then be compared to the locations of (1) major trip generators, and (2) available transportation services.

The following exhibit 1 illustrates the areas where the number of older adults (age 65 and older) is at or above the national average.

Exhibit 1: Map of Population Density of Individuals Age 65 and Older


Population 65 and Older Meigs County, Ohio

Exhibit 2: Map of Density of Zero Vehicle Households


Households with No Vehicle Available



Analysis of Demographic Data

The density of individuals age 65 and older is spread amongst six townships to include; Scipio, Bedford, Orange, Rutland, Salisbury and Chester. The largest density is in Bedford covering almost 90% of the Township. These areas have no access at this time to transportation unless they can utilize NET transportation for medical appointments or residents of that county belong to an organization that will provide private transportation. Most seniors in Meigs County reside outside of the city limits and in areas further away from medical care facilities and senior services.

The highest percentage of zero vehicle households is in the Salisbury far west corner of the county, this area shows that 17.8% of residents do not have a vehicle. Revealing a population in desperate need of transportation services or programs.

Major trip generators are located mostly in Middleport and Pomeroy. The rural areas of the county need to travel to these cities in order to gain access to job opportunities, medical facilities, food access, social service agencies and educational institutions.

Based on the demographic data above, it is crucial that affordable transportation options are available for community members residing in the rural areas of the county, especially seniors and zero vehicle households, in order to connect them to a variety of services available elsewhere in the county.

General Public and Stakeholder Meetings/Focus Groups

The Meigs County Mobility Manager hosted and facilitated 5 local meetings and focus groups to discuss the unmet transportation needs and gaps in mobility and transportation. Twenty people participated in the meetings. Of those, one self-identified as an older adult and one self-identified as being a person with a disability. More information about what meetings were held and attendance at those meetings is available upon request.

Participants discussed more than nine mobility issues to achieve, preserve, avoid, or eliminate through coordination during the meetings. Coordinated transportation stakeholders will consider these unmet needs when developing transportation goals and strategies, and grant applications. The exhibit at the end of this section provides a summary of the unmet mobility needs discussed during the meeting as well as the needs identified by the survey results.

Surveys





In the graph above, the first number represents the age of the respondents, the number in parenthesis represents the total of respondents.


Table 2: Self-Identified: Table 2 illustrates that the general public, low-income, elderly and disabled individuals participated.



In the graph above, the first number represents the number of individuals in the household, the number in parenthesis represents the total of respondents.


Table 3: Number of Individuals in the Household: Table 3 illustrates that most respondents live with 2 or more individuals in their household




How far away is your place of employment from your home? 378 Responses


Places I need to go to (Please check all that apply to you & your family):



Final Insights and Analysis of Data: General Population Survey

Meigs County residents who are low-income, have a disability or those who are elderly have a serious need for transportation. A large majority of the low-income residents lack the resources that it takes in order to complete basic daily functions such as travel to work, medical resources, educational institutions and the grocery store. Many residential respondents are not employed, some of the factors are due to the lack of transportation resources in our community. In conjunction with limited resources we also face another issue of lack of resources connecting the more rural areas to the major trip generators in Pomeroy, Middleport and Reedsville.

Financial hardships also serve as a barrier for Meigs County residents. Not only is there no transportation for the general public in the community; if options were available there would be an inability to pay for the services that were offered.




Table 12: Number of individuals in Senior Respondents' Households






Table 15: How do you get to your destinations?




Table 16: How often do you have medical appointments that are located outside of Meigs County?




Table 17: What days of the week are difficult for you to find transportation services?




Table 18: If you depend on others for any of your trips, who do you depend on?




Table 19: Over the past 3 months, how much did you rely on family, friends, or neighbors for transportation?





Table 20: Regarding private transportation services (taxis), which of the following are true for you?

Final Insights and Analysis of Data: Seniors




Table 22: Respondents Residence




Table 23: Respondents Self-identified Disability






Table 24: Respondents Destinations





Table 27: Medical Appointments


How often do you have medical appointments?




Table 28: Days difficult to find transportation options





Table 29: What problems do you have getting the transportation you want?







Challenges to Coordinated Transportation

In addition to identifying needs, the planning committee gathered information from stakeholders and used their own professional experience to identify challenges to providing coordinated transportation services. These challenges include the following:

- Most of the County lacks transportation options, the transportation options that are available are limited based on certain criteria one must follow
- Private Transportation providers are working at full capacities
- Communication between providers is not consistent.
- Different fares and ways of calculating fares prevent coordination of efforts.

Summary of Unmet Mobility Needs

The following table describes the identified unmet transportation needs that were identified and the method used to identify and prioritize each need. Needs are listed in order of their rank in highest to lowest priority.

V. Goals and Strategies

Developing Strategies to Address Gaps and Needs

Strategies for improving transportation for Meigs County should address the service gaps and user needs identified in this plan, if they are to be effective. As described, the gaps and unmet needs were based on information obtained from geographic analysis, the attendees participating in the meetings, and responses to the public survey.

Based on information gathered throughout the planning process, the Meigs County Department of Job and Family Services has developed the following strategies to address the gaps and unmet transportation needs. Priority levels are assigned by considering the primary funding sources that could be available to support plan implementation compared to the importance of meeting this unmet need expressed by the public and stakeholders. Not all strategies are activities specifically eligible for funding under the existing programs, nor is it guaranteed that funding will be available to achieve every strategy identified. In addition, the local stakeholders will need to provide support and commit to pursuing the strategies if they are to be accomplished. Nonetheless, these strategies have been tailored to 10 of the identified primary gaps and needs.

Below is an outline describing the prioritized strategies to address each of the identified unmet transportation needs and gaps in service.

Goal #1:

Lack of Public Transportation in Meigs County

Need(s) being addressed: Ensuring Meigs county is fully aligned and prepared to apply for grant funding to make transportation in Meigs county a possibility. Assuring affordable, county-wide, door-to-door transportation services for seniors and individuals with disabilities.

Strategy 1.1:

Apply for and receive funding to fund a Transit system in Meigs County.

Timeline for Implementation: Present to mid-2021

Action Steps:

- ***Complete the letter of intent***
- ***Apply for funding***
- ***Await confirmation or denial from ODOT***
- ***Receive 5310 funding***
- ***Purchase vehicles***
- ***Hire Drivers, dispatchers and a transportation supervisor***
- ***Implement a transportation system for Meigs County***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County Job and Family Services and the Meigs County mobility manager

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: Ohio Department of Transportation & Federal Transit Administration

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, contract services, building space, vehicles publications/printing, local cash, technology and capital needs

Potential Cost Range: Will advise at a later date

Potential Funding Sources: 5310 and/or 5311 funding

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Letter of intent**
- **Application of funds**
- **Acceptance of application for funds requested**
- **Hire a transportation supervisor, drivers and dispatchers**
- **Complete safety and training checks with all employees**

Goals completed: Meigs County now has a fully operational Transit Program that is operating, both 5310 and 5311. There are currently eight Full Time Drivers operating Transit and one Full Time NET Driver, two Full Time Dispatchers, Transportation Supervisor, and a fleet of vehicles which are which are handicap accessible. Tentatively, Transit will be hiring another seven drivers which will offer even more transportation services for the elderly, disabled, low income, as well as the general public.

Goal #2:

AFFORDABLE FARES

Need(s) being addressed: Seniors, individuals with disabilities, low-income families are currently unable to utilize any other form of transportation due to financial restraints.

Strategy 1.1:

Collectively audit in this plan the types of available services and what options exist. Collect and analyze data for lowered or free fare options once transportation in Meigs County becomes available.

Timeline for Implementation: Mid-January 2021

Action Steps:

- ***Document the need of lowered or free fares***
- ***Complete multiple surveys in Meigs County to show the need***
- ***Once transit options are available create a piolet program showing the usage and need***
- ***Identify funding sources to support***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County Job and Family Services and the Meigs County mobility manager

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: Local transportation providers and identified funding sources

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, contract services, building space, vehicles publications/printing, local cash, technology and capital needs

Potential Cost Range: Will depend on project scale

Potential Funding Sources: Contract revenue, ODOT 5310 & 5311 Grant funding, Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities and Meigs County Job and Family Services

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Complete a needs assessment study**
- **Completion of budget and funding sources to reduce or eliminate fares**
- **Application award and funding**

Goal Completed- Currently Meigs County is able to offer free transportation for all Door to Door services for Elderly, Disabled, Low Income, as well as for the general public.

Goal #3:

SUSTAINING THE MOBILITY MANAGEMENT PROGRAM

Need(s) being addressed: Currently there is a lack of knowledge and understanding of the transportation options in Meigs County. Mobility Management will allow for the coordination of services, advocacy for transportation & transportation resources as well as provide education and utilization of services.

Strategy 1.1:

When completing the Countywide survey and roundtable meetings with stakeholders, across the board there is a serious lack of knowledge on what services are available. The mobility management program will allow for many doors to be opened regarding advocating for multimodule transportation options, training, understanding and outreach in our community. Will encourage meetings with various stakeholders in the community to gain more ideas and ways to meet the needs of the members in our County!

Timeline for Implementation: Present-2022

Action Steps:

- ***Increase and advocate for multimodule transportation options***
- ***Increase awareness by teaching, training and outreach of all our current transportation options, programs and vouchers***
- ***Increase current transportation capacities when possible***
- ***Ensuring transportation is included in future considerations in our county/community***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County mobility manager

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: Meigs County, Meigs County Job and Family Services, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Meigs Council on Aging and the Ohio Department of Transportation

Resources Needed: Continuation of the 5311 Grant and local match funds

Potential Cost Range: \$80,000 +

Potential Funding Sources: Meigs County, Meigs County Job and Family Services, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Meigs Council on Aging and the Ohio Department of Transportation

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Quarterly mobility reports**
- **Goal completion in the Meigs County Coordination Transportation Plan**
- **Continued surveying and outreach in the County**

Need(s) being addressed: Bringing awareness to the current active transportation plan. Infrastructure, planning and policy adoption, complete streets policy awareness and knowledge, and knowledge of PSE (policy systems and environmental) change

Strategy 1.1:

Increase opportunities for physical activity with well-designed sidewalks, on-street bicycle facilities and multiuse trails. Support active transportation initiatives through schools, health care professionals, community services, elected officials, and businesses. Boost the local economy by capitalizing on walking and bicycling recreational opportunities in Meigs County.

Timeline for Implementation: Immediate 1-2 years | Short-term 3-5 years | Medium to long-term 5+ years

Action Steps:

- ***Conduct outreach and education***
- ***Collect data and evaluation measures***
- ***Advocacy for Active Transportation***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County Active Transportation Team

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: Meigs County Health Department, Meigs County Department of Job & Family Services, ODOT, Toole Design, Buckeye Hills Regional Council and County Government

Resources Needed: Funding/capital, staff time, support, publications and proper signage

Potential Cost Range: Dependent on projects pursued/needed

Potential Funding Sources: Recreational Trails Program (RTP), Clean Ohio Trails Fund (COTF), Highway Safety Improvement Program (ODOT) and Safe Routes to School (SRTS)

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Track the amount of active Transportation related events or activities**
- **The length of infrastructure**
- **Amount of Active Transportation policies passed**
- **Funding awarded for projects**

Goal Ongoing- The current Active Transportation Plan is operated by the Meigs County Health Department and is working closely with the Meigs County Mobility Management. Continual growth and funding needed to better assist Safe Accesses for walking paths whereby elderly, those with disabilities as well as the general public can safely get to needed areas

Goal #5:

CONNECTING THE MORE RURAL AREAS WITH TRANSPORTATION OPTIONS IN AND OUT OF THE COUNTY

Need(s) being addressed: Many residents are homebound due to the lack of transportation in Meigs County. Having a transit system available in our county will assist with not only getting individuals countywide where they need to get to and from within the county but also assisting individuals with the option to travel outside the county.

Strategy 1.1:

Currently Meigs residents do not equally have the option for transportation to get to and from where they need to go. The options of utilizing taxi services outside Meigs is not at all cost effective and for most residents it is not an option at all due to lack of funds. Having a transit route within the county will give residents an option to leave their home and go from point A to B as they choose. It will also give them options to travel outside of Meigs county.

Timeline for Implementation: 2021

Action Steps:

- ***Create a data/survey database that allows users to always update new areas they need to go and determine common locations based off from data***
- ***Increase education of transit options for better awareness and future community participation***
- ***Understand needs based on current coordinated transportation plan and strive to fulfill those needs***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County Job and Family Services & the Meigs County mobility manager

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: Meigs County, Meigs County Job and Family Services, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Meigs Council on Aging and the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT)

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, contract services, building space, vehicles publications/printing, local cash, technology and capital needs

Potential Cost Range: Will depend on project scale

Potential Funding Sources: Contract revenue, ODOT 5310 & 5311 Grant funding, Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities and Meigs County Job and Family Services

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **To implement a transportation program**
- **To identify community needs and gain buy-in from the community**
- **Create a few central “hubs” in the area to connect Meigs county with other transportation providers outside of Meigs county**
- **Quarterly mobility reports**
- **Goal completion in the Meigs County Coordination Transportation Plan**
- **Continued surveying and outreach in the County**

Goal Ongoing- Door to door transportation is currently reaching all parts of the county including the most remote areas, by means of the Meigs Couth Public Transit as well as other providers. These transportation services are offering handicap accessible transportation to be able to provide services for elderly, people with disability, as well as low-income residents in which they can reach these “hub” areas that include health care, legal services, government agencies as well as shopping and more. While this growth has been a tremendous positive resource, there is still room for growth to better serve in these remote areas of the county.

Goal #6:

ADA COMPLIANCE AMONGST PROVIDERS

Need(s) being addressed: 19% of Meigs County is disabled and 20.4% of the county is 65+ years of age. All vehicles operating in the county should have the capacity to accommodate at least one wheelchair. Some providers submitted that they did not have any handicap accessible vehicles.

Strategy 1.1:

Creating a committee in Meigs County that works with and assists operators who operate in our county with suggestions, comments and/or concerns prior to making a new vehicle purchase. This committee would be able to ensure that at least one (or more) vehicle(s) in the fleet is able to provide the services needed in this county.

Timeline for Implementation: 2021-22

Action Steps:

- **Create a committee whose focus is to ensure ADA compliance among all of our preferred and non-preferred suppliers**
- **Complete surveys before, after and during trips**

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County mobility manager

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: Meigs County, Meigs County Job and Family Services, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities and Meigs Council on Aging

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, contract services, building space, vehicles publications/printing, local cash, technology and capital needs

Potential Cost Range: Will depend on project scale

Potential Funding Sources: Ohio Developmental Disabilities Council, Meigs County Board of Developmental Disabilities and Meigs County Job and Family Services

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Create a committee**
- **Invite key stakeholders in the community who can add value and represent the committee**
- **Implement a process that requires providers to ensure ADA compliance in their fleet**

Goal Completed- The Meigs County Mobility Management TAC includes and has great respect for the feedback of Committee Members who are citizens with disability and elderly citizens. These TAC members are active and are the eyes and ears of the needed ADA resources within our county. These TAC members are offered handicap assisted transportation to and from the TAC meetings. A strong connection has been implemented with Meigs County Board of DD, Inclusions, the Meigs County JFS, and the Meigs County Council on Ageing.

Goal #7:

COMMUNICATION EFFORTS COUNTY WIDE OF SERVICES THAT ARE OFFERED

Need(s) being addressed: Communicating multimodule transportation options more efficiently and effectively throughout the entire county. Addressing needs and ensuring that all community members are aware of the updates and changes throughout the county.

Strategy 1.1:

Audit all transportation providers in the county. Understand what types of services they offer, how often, how much and create multiple places for community members to access this database. Go to council, city and other important stakeholder meetings in the county, advertise in local newspapers, social media and flyers to show what options are out there and how to utilize those services.

Timeline for Implementation: Present and continuing

Action Steps:

- ***Document calls and incoming questions for better understanding of where there are gaps in communication***
- ***Complete multiple different surveys for continued growth and understanding of community barriers and needs***
- ***Identify funding sources for advertising and promotion of services***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County Job and Family Services and the Meigs County mobility manager

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: The Transportation Coordinated Planning Committee, Meigs County Job and Family Services and the Meigs County mobility manager

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, contract services, building space, vehicles publications/printing, local cash, technology and capital needs

Potential Cost Range: Will depend on project scale

Potential Funding Sources: Meigs County Mobility Management funds

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Complete multiple roundtable sessions and encourage Meigs County residents, business owners, churches, and others valuable stakeholders to attend**
- **Offer “free” rides to multiple groups of individuals for familiarity. Gain feedback and learn from the feedback given**
- **Implement communication strategies across Meigs County**

Goal Completed- During the initial operation of Meigs County Mobility Management, gathering all the transportation resources was implemented into the coordinated plan which includes the services they provide. As transportation resources have grown, updates have been verified which has allowed for knowledge and utilization simple and allow Mobility Management to provide information of services to residents of Meigs County who are disabled, elderly, and low-income. Currently all transportation services are free of charge to all residents.

Goal #8:

SIDEWALK SAFETY AUDIT

Need(s) being addressed: Completing a sidewalk safety audit for all major sidewalks in Meigs county to address concerns brought forward in this plan and to ensure ADA compliance throughout the county/sidewalks

Strategy 1.1:

Sara Hill, Meigs County Health Department Creating Healthy Communities, is creating a group to complete sidewalk audits in Pomeroy. Looking to expand that audit throughout the entire county so that all sidewalks are covered to ensure compliance.

Timeline for Implementation: December 20-21

Action Steps:

- **Complete an audit of sidewalks in Meigs County**
- **Understand barriers and prepare a document outlining issues**
- **Work with different grants to make changes as deemed necessary**

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: Meigs County Active Transportation Planning Committee

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: The Transportation Coordinated Planning Committee, Meigs County Health Department, Meigs County Job and Family Services and the Meigs County mobility manager

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, contract services, building space, vehicles publications/printing, local cash, technology and capital needs

Potential Cost Range: Will depend on project scale

Potential Funding Sources: Grants

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Complete a safety audit of Meigs County sidewalks**
- **Prepare documentation showing areas that need attention**
- **Receive grant funding in order to fix the major problem areas as we can**

Goal Ongoing- Meigs County Mobility Management has kept a close contact with the Meigs County Health Department and the Village Mayors to continually evaluate sidewalk safety or the possibility of creating new safe walk zones within the county. Some villages have already completed reconstruction of walkways or added new safe walk zones. This goal will be a continual to provide easy access for elderly and people with disabilities in the future years as well.

Goal #9:

COORDINATION OF EFFORTS

Need(s) being addressed: Overlapping of services and efforts results in gaps throughout the community and within transportation providers

Strategy 1.1:

A coordination of efforts and services would allow more vehicles to travel to more areas of the County and potentially provide rides to more individuals. As several transportation providers require training and

safety certifications for their staff a coordination of services would allow providers to receive this collectively

Timeline for Implementation: January 2021-January 2025

Action Steps:

- ***Create partnership with local transportation providers***
- ***Utilize the information in the Meigs County Coordinated Transportation Plan to identify gaps and coordination possibilities***
- ***Begin a coordination of efforts and services***

Parties Responsible for Leading Implementation: The Meigs County Mobility Management Program

Parties Responsible for Supporting Implementation: The Ohio Department of Transportation and local transportation providers

Resources Needed: Funding, staff time, local cash, technology, and training

Potential Cost Range: Will depend on project scale

Potential Funding Sources: The Meigs County Mobility Management Program

Performance Measures/Targets:

- **Level of responses from transportation providers**
- **Conducting a coordinated training event**
- **Conducting a coordinated ride**

Goal Completed- Meigs County Mobility Management has worked closely with all possible forms of transportation services available within the county such as Veterans Service Office, Meigs County Public Transit, and Meigs County Council on Ageing.

Goals and Strategies (2023 Goals- Updated October 2022)

Goal 1: WALK/BIKE PATH ROUTES FOR SAFE ZONES AND ACCESSABILITIES IN COLLABERATION WITH COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROJECT

Strategy 1.1:

Continued collaboration of the walking/biking path which will connect the upper end of Pomeroy and run completely through the lower end of Middleport which will create healthy activities as well as mobility for handicap assisted devices to ensure mobility throughout the highest economical and health care related area in Meigs County. Planning of other Safe Walk Zones to include areas near schools and business districts for better mobility access for elderly and disabled citizens. This is a continual goal due to monitoring the safety and upkeep for the combined efforts of all partnering entities.

Strategy 1.2:

Assess any damage to this walk/bike path that may require repair. Upkeep and maintenance surrounding the walk/bike path is completed by the Village of Pomeroy and the Village of Middleport. The original section of the walk/bike path, which runs from Kerr Street in Pomeroy to the lower end of the Pomeroy Parking Lot. Assessment of this section needs to be evaluated in a couple of sections for safety and possible repair. Collaborating with partnering agencies will be needing to revisit these sections.

Strategy 1.3:

Market the benefits, accessibilities, and safety of the walk/bike path zone intended for all forms of mobility for the public, ADA accessibility, and the economy within Meigs County.

Goal Completed: Additional stretch of walk/bike path has been completed which runs from the lower end of Middleport and continues into the restaurant area of Pomeroy complete with pavement markings, signage, and barriers for safety. Also flashing pedestrian crossing signs have been added into Syracuse as well as signage being utilized in Pomeroy for pedestrian rights-of-way during activities such as Farmers Market.

Goal 2: CONTINUED GROWTH OF TRANSPORTATION RESOURCES AND FUNDING FOR THE FUTURE OF TRANSPORTATION WITHIN THE COUNTY WHICH WOULD INCREASE THE AVAILABILITY OF SERVICES

Strategy 2.1:

Connecting Stakeholders, Elected Officials, Businesses, Transportation Providers, and Government Agencies to explain the benefits of transportation programs and secure further financial support from the local area. With continual growth of transportation assistance, we are still seeing a need for growth and funding due to the number of ride requests verses the availability in resources. We need to continue looking at areas in which we can further offer transportation services, with the goal of providing these services for Elderly, Disabled, and Low-Income. Ongoing

Strategy 2.2:

Expand services to allow for longer available hours of transportation assistance and more availability for same day scheduling for local transports. Using up to date computer scheduling software to help make same day requests and better scheduling possible. Being able to offer these transportation services during off peak hours for the Elderly, Disabled, and Low-Income population. Ongoing

Strategy 2.3:

Solicit the importance of funding from local government, community groups/organizations, and businesses owners to further benefit them and the citizens of our community by means of being able to provide transportation for Elderly, Disabled, and Low-Income to their establishments. Secure MOU contracts for purchase of service agreement throughout agencies within the county.

Goal Completed- Additional contract company (ies) have been added to Medicaid Eligible transports. Meigs County Council on Aging has re-implemented their Senior Transport services. Meigs County Veterans Service Office has hired extra staffing for more transportation for Veterans. Meigs County Public Transit has continued to grow in vehicle fleet making more available access for public transportation. Meigs County Public Transit has also included multi-passenger vehicles to their fleet which allows the possibility for group rides with the hopes of Loop Routes in the near future.

Goal 3: UNITY BETWEEN AGENCIES AND THE PUBLIC FOR THE GOAL OF TRANSPARENCY.

Strategy 3.1:

Maintaining a strong working relationship with the Buckeye Hills Regional Council, Region 8 Mobility Management, Meigs County Health Department's Program Director of Creating Healthy Communities, Meigs County Area on Aging, Veterans' Services Office, Meigs County Commissioners, Elected Officials, TAC Group and all stakeholders.

Strategy 3.2:

Continue outreach efforts with the citizens in which Meigs County Mobility Management can educate about the resources available and listen to concerns from the Elderly, Disabled, and Low-Income population of Meigs County, as well as Healthcare Professionals, Agency Administrators, and Business Owners and Elected Officials.

Goal Completed: Through coordinated efforts of multiple agencies within the county and regionally, routine meetings, events and collaborations, the efforts of outreach is reaching the far edges of Meigs County and continues to grow the needed transports for the residents' needs.

Goals and Strategies (2025 Goals- Updated July 2024)

Goal 1: Begin to provide Loop Routes within designated areas by means of multi-passenger vehicles.

Strategy 1.1:

Providing Loop Routes to better assist daily needs of residents to common areas such as grocery stores, banks, shopping areas, legal assistance, government agencies without scheduling far in advance. Allowing retirement properties to benefits group rides to food areas within the loop such as the Mulbury Community Center or the Meigs County Senior Center in which they could have cost effective meals as well as peer engagement and exercise at the facilities.

Strategy 1.2:

Assign driver (s) specific to the Loop Route which could allow more open availabilities for the On-Demand transport schedule to those residents that need to get to medical facilities.

Goal 2: Provide training for agencies and volunteers throughout the county with safe transportation options.

Strategy 2.1:

Become a certified trainer in vehicle safety options for both the public and for agencies who transport the public. Provide educational services at events within the county and be able to assist other counties with their events.

Strategy 2.2:

By offering training vehicle training services, Meigs County Mobility Management would assist in the advocacy of safe roadways by educating Seniors, Agency Drivers, Contract Drivers, and more.

Goal 3: Continued coalition efforts with individual villages along the river for future access of mobility wellness zones along the riverfront.

Strategy 2.1:

Assist villages with the future revitalizing efforts of the riverfront areas, whereby public access can safely be utilized for walking/biking/kayaking/boating and other recreational activities as well as keeping handicap accessibility as a priority for safety.

Strategy 2.2:

By assisting villages with these future pathways and opportunities, Meigs County Mobility Management seeks to assist in providing activities in which would be exercise for good health and wellbeing of

residents. Combined assistance in these healthy activities could range from walking paths to handicap accessible exercise equipment, resting areas, hydration stations, pet friendly areas, and more. All of this can lead to a healthier lifestyle for the public.

Therefore, Mobility Management continues to educate the public and agencies around the county by means of outreach efforts, events, and meetings.

Appendix C: Definitions

There are several terms used throughout the plan that may be unique to transportation providers or human service agencies. The terms are defined here for reference.

Coordination – Collaborative efforts toward understanding and meeting the mobility needs in the most appropriate, cost effective, and responsive manner.

FAST Act – Congress established the funding for Federal Transit Administration programs through authorizing legislation that amends Chapter 53 of Title 49 of the U.S. Code. On December 4, 2015, President Obama signed the Fixing America’s Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, reauthorizing surface transportation programs through Fiscal Year 2020.

Gaps in Service – A break in the continuity of available transportation resources such as a break between hours of operation or a break between two or more geographic areas.

Lead Agency – The organization responsible for facilitating outreach; composing a plan that meets the requirements of current Federal and State legislation; maintaining documentation from the planning process and making it available upon request; and leading stakeholders through annual reviews, amendments, and updates of the plan. The Lead Agency also is responsible for submitting the adopted Coordinated Plan and all amendments or updates to participating stakeholders and ODOT.

Planning Committee – (indicate if the planning committee has another formal name) The Planning Committee is composed of key community stakeholders. The Planning Committee members agree to actively participate in the planning process and act as the plan advisory and adopting entity.

Ridership – The total number of passengers who boarded transportation vehicles are counted each time they board a vehicle.

Section 5310 Program – Enhanced Mobility of Seniors & Individuals with Disabilities (49 U.S.C. 5310) provides Federal formula funding for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit groups in meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs. The program aims to improve mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation mobility options.

Section 5311 Program – The Formula Grants for Rural Areas program provides capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with populations of less than 50,000 where many residents often rely on public transit to reach their destinations. The program also provides funding for state and national training and technical assistance through the Rural Transportation Assistance Program. Subrecipients may include state or local government authorities, nonprofit organizations, and operators of public transportation or intercity bus service.

Section 5307 Program – The Urbanized Area Formula Grants program (49 U.S.C. 5307) makes federal resources available to urbanized areas and to governors for transit capital and operating assistance in urbanized areas and for transportation-related planning. An urbanized area is an incorporated area with a population of 50,000 or more.

Transportation – Transportation is broadly defined to include traditional transit, human service agency services, on-demand (taxi-like) services, bicycle and pedestrian programs and amenities.

Unmet Transportation Needs – Transportation that is wanted or desired but is not currently available.
